

Gospel reading: Matthew 6:25-33



This week's Eco Tips: With winter approaching, why not make a draft-excluder 'sausage' to put at the bottom of an exterior door? All that's needed is a length of fabric about 10cms longer than the width of the door and 25cms wide (an eco choice would be left-over curtain fabric), a needle, thread, some stuffing. No need for shop-bought stuffing; improvise with clean old tights/ old towel.Fold your fabric lengthways with the right sides together, and stitch them along one end and the open side (by hand if you've no sewing machine, or are helping a child). Turn your sausage right side out. Insert your stuffing. Stitch up the other end.
